

## **Genocide Studies and the Climate Emergency**

Facing the reality of where we have arrived, and the truth of what we are on the cusp of, is now beyond urgent. The challenge confronting us is threefold : as scholars, teachers and human beings.

perpetrators, nor victims, it is equally unconscionable that we might be bystanders in the face of what amounts to omnicide. This is not just a matter of the way we think through and change the practice of our collegial discourses, moving away, for instance, from repeated air travel for meetings and symposia to methods such as zoom whereby we operate within the carrying capacity of the planet. Nor is it either simply a matter of radically reducing our day to day carbon footprint in our homes, transport, holidays, or what we eat, wear and otherwise consume.
