

INTRODUCTION

The New Jersey 2nd Congressional District is made up of a mixture of urban and rural areas with suburban areas becoming the key factor in who wins an election in the district. The 2nd Congressional District has been considered a swing district that has elected both 'HPRFUDWV DQG 5HSXEOLFDQV WR RIILFH ,Q WKH HOHFWLRC had voted for Obama in 2008 and 2012 pivoted to vote for Trump in 2016. The 2nd District has long been said to lean Republican, and the 2020 election showed the GOP was still dominant within the district as in 2016. All the counties within the district voted along the same party lines SUHVLGHQWLDO H-Porbfife WaterRoQthe 7c Knighre Ssilon/al/Vsetat_FW ¶V KL. DV LQ WKH between Republican Jeff Van Drew and Democrat Amy Kennedy was the least competitive of WKH GLVWULFW¶V WKUHH IHGHUDO HOHFWLRQV ZLWK 9DQ 'UHZ voted Republican and municipalities that had voted for him in the previous election cycle as a Democrat. Van Drew also garnered the largest number of votes of any candidate within the 2nd District. Republican Donald Trump won the 2nd District, as he did in 2016. The race for the U.S. Senate seat was the closest between the three federal races with two percentage points VHSDUDWLQJ WKH WZR PDLQ FDQGLGDWHV 7KLV HOHFWLRQ¶V U which the New Jersey 2nd Congressional District is headed regarding voting patterns and party alignments within counties and municipalities.

PRESIDENT

7KH 5HSXEOLFDQ SUHVLGHQWLDO FDQGLGDWH 'RQDOG 7UXF Congressional District by three percentage points (Trump 51%- Biden 48%,) and in a vote of 193,906 to 183,151, according to this analysis. The Democratic candidate, Joe Biden, was able WR FKLS DZD\ DW 7UXP & Interpretate of Interpretate Candidate, Hillary Clinton. Trump kept the same vote share in the district as the 2016 election, while Biden was able to increase the Democratic vote share by two percentage

points. While county winners fell along the same party lines from the 2016 presidential election, during this election Trump saw decreases in all winning margins at the county level from 2016 to 2020 except for Burlington, which is an extremely small portion of the district. Trump lost 8 points off his win margin from 2016 (31 points to 23 points) in Ocean County, followed by Cape May and Gloucester County with a four-point decrease. Biden kept the same winning margins that Hillary Clinton won in 2016 for both Cumberland and Atlantic County. In terms of vote share, Trump remained within one point of his 2016 percentages at the county level, except in Ocean County where Trump, again, saw the largest decrease of three percentage points from his vote share. The Democratic vote share increased from the 2016 election in all counties, except Burlington where it remained at 30 percent. However, despite these gains, Biden still held the same winning margin that Hillary Clinton won in Atlantic and Cumberland counties since Trump's vote share also increased slightly from the 2016 election in those counties.

Trump won most municipalities (72%) in the district whereas Biden had large winning margins in urban centers. In 29 of the municipalities that Trump won, he garnered over 60% of the vote share. Biden, on the other hand, won 26 municipalities (28%) in the district with only eight of those municipalities gaining over 60% of the vote share. Biden, however, had the two largest winning margins within municipalities with a 70 percentage point margin in Pleasantville City and 61 percentage point winning margin in Salem City.

Biden was able to flip four municipalities within the district that voted Republican in 2016: Cape May City, East Greenwich Township, Somers Point City, and Woolwich Township. The largest change came from East Greenwich Township with Biden gaining 13 percentage points and Trump losing 10 percentage points. Somers Point City had the smallest change with Biden gaining three percentage points. East Greenwich Township is also the only municipality in the 2nd Congressional District to vote Democrat in the presidential race but vote Republican in the Senatorial and Congressional races.

SENATE

The Republican Senatorial candidate, Rik Mehta, won the New Jersey 2nd

Congressional District. Mehta beat the Democratic candidate, incumbent Sen. Cory Booker, by

two percentage points in the district, 185,713 for Mehta to 17,955 for Booker. At the state level,

however, Booker won reelection for the Senate seat by 16.3 percentage points. Despite

municipalities went Republican for Trump and Van Drew but then voted for Democrat Booker.

share of 57.2% of the vote, whereas Mehta had a larger vote share on the district level by 7.1

percentage points compared to his statewide performance. Biden and Booker had the same

percentage of vote share in the district, while Trump had a one percentage point larger vote

same at the district level.

The senatorial race saw the counties vote along the same party lines as the presidential race. The senatorial and presidential Democratic candidates had the same vote share in Atlantic County while Booker had a one percentage point higher vote share than Biden in Cumberland County. Booker, an incumbent first elected in 2013, had a larger winning margin than Biden in both counties: Atlantic County with one percentage point higher and Cumberland County with three percentage points more.

Mehta underperformed Trump in most of the district. In all but three counties ² Cape
May, Gloucester, and Ocean ² Trump had a larger vote share than Mehta. In Cape May and
Gloucester County, Mehta and Trump had the same vote share, while in Ocean County Mehta
had a larger vote share by one percentage point. In the majority of the counties, Trump also had
larger winning margins than Mehta with the largest being a three-point difference in their

Drew ¶ V Y R W letx ded and Wheth tha ¶ M all the counties apart from Camden and Ocean County, where they were the same. Trump and Van Drew had the same winning margin in Burlington County. Trump had larger winning margins in Camden and Salem County, but Van Drew had larger winning margins in Cape May, Gloucester, and Ocean County. Trump and Van Drew had the same vote share in Burlington and Cumberland County. Trump only had one percentage point more vote share than Van Drew in Salem and Camden County. Whereas, Van Drew had higher vote shares than Trump in four counties with the highest difference being a four-percentage point difference in Cape May County.
